

## The Questions of Suffering

Job 1:20-22 (HCSB)

Then Job stood up, tore his robe, and shaved his head. He fell to the ground and worshiped, <sup>21</sup> saying: Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked I will leave this life. The Lord gives, and the Lord takes away. Praise the name of Yahweh. <sup>22</sup> Throughout all this Job did not sin or blame God for anything.

## Job 2:9-10 (HCSB)

His wife said to him, "Do you still retain your integrity? Curse God and die!" <sup>10</sup> "You speak as a foolish woman speaks," he told her. "Should we accept only good from God and not adversity?" Throughout all this Job did not sin in what he said.

- I. Am I asking the right question?
  - Saying the world is unjust admits transcendent justice.
  - In the face of evil and suffering abandoning your <u>faith</u> in God doesn't help you at all.
  - God is not the source of suffering; He is the solution to suffering.
- 2. Could the point of suffering exist beyond my ability to presently understand?
  - If God is a God infinite in love and power would it not also make sense that He be infinite in wisdom? (Job 37:23-24; Job 38:1-6)

- Could it be that God allows evil to exist so that we might see the world for what it
  is and seek God for who He is?
- Pain and suffering weakens our <u>attachment</u> to this world and strengthens our <u>dependence</u> on God.
- Suffering is <u>temporary</u> and <u>transformational</u>. (Revelation 21:1; Revelation 21:4-5)
- 3. Am I truly born again?
  - God uses suffering to reveal His true worshipers.
     (1 John 2:3-6; Acts 5:40-42)
  - How we handle suffering reveals who has a handle on us.
  - Could God be using my suffering to reveal Himself to others?

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
